

"Through Our Garden Gates" — MAMG Public Garden Tour Draws Near

How do Master Gardeners meet the challenges in their own gardens? Saturday, June 5, 9am-4pm, Memphis Area Master Gardeners invite the public "Through Our Garden Gates" to eight gardens where Master Gardeners have solved drainage problems, fought weeds, built water features, selected plants for sun and shade, maximized small spaces, and made large spaces more intimate.

Garden hosts will be on-site at each garden throughout the day to answer visitors' questions and to provide plant lists. In addition, different gardens will feature presentations by experts on weed control, shady plants, tree care, and other topics.

Visitors can begin their tour at any of the gardens from East Memphis to Collierville. Maps are available at the Memphis Area Master Gardener website www.memphisareamastergardeners.org and will be available at each garden. The \$10 admission covers all eight gardens.

Tour Details:

3835 Woodland Drive, Memphis. Sharon Kauertz, a charter member of Memphis Area Master Gardeners, eradicated pokeweed and bamboo to develop her shady garden with paths and a water garden. Sharon meets the challenges of dry shade and uses containers to take advantage of the few hours of direct sun on her large patio.

3828 Kearney Avenue, Memphis. Patsy Courtright's garden is an oasis on a small corner lot near University of Memphis. Patsy has found space for a shade garden, roses, trees, lawn, a kitchen garden, a bird sanctuary, and a pond with waterfall. Ken Zimmerman of Something Fishy Aquariums & Ponds will be on-site throughout the day.

7374 Abercrombie, Memphis. Mary Lange has a large corner lot with arbors, paths, a garden house with potting table, seating areas, and a lush assortment of plants. Stone mason Cary Smith will be on-site 10:00-2:00 to answer questions about the solutions he built for drainage issues in the Lange garden.

8872 Plantation Trail Cove, Cordova. Carolyn Gibson and Joan Vandiveer turned a drainage problem into a feature by installing a dry creek bed with an attractive bridge. Larry Tucker, past president of the Hosta Society, will be on hand 11:00-12:00 with advice about shade planting.

The following matters have already been voted on and approved by membership. However, membership will also need to vote on the accompanying bylaw changes required to implement the matters.

The vote will be at the June meeting.

The first two changes deal with changing from a fiscal year running from September 1 through August 31 to a January to December calendar year.

The last change includes language allowing MAMG to provide scholarships.

The specific language changes will be:

Article IV - Meetings, Section 2 - Annual Meeting, change from

The regular meeting in July shall be known as the annual meeting and shall be for the purpose of electing officers, receiving reports of officers and committees, and for any other business that may arise.

The regular meeting in November shall be known as the annual meeting and shall be for the purpose of electing officers, receiving reports of officers and committees, and for any other business that may

Article V - Officers of the Association, Section 8 - Nominaton Procedure, Time of Elections, change from

The Executive Board shall appoint a Nominating Committee of five members before the May meeting. This committee elects its own chair and prepares a slate of candidates for offices to be filled at the July meeting.

The Executive Board shall appoint a Nominating Committee of five members before the September meeting. This committee elects its own chair and prepares a slate of candidates for offices to be filled at the November meeting.

The following will be added to Article X, Section 2:

The organization may also, from time to time, award scholarships in furtherance of the purposes set forth in the purpose clause hereof. Any such scholarship shall be fully compliant with both federal and state laws and regulations governing the granting of scholarships by a non profit organization.

President Carol Watkins called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m. She announced that Vice-President Genie Ashworth was in Haiti doing volunteer work. Carol then introduced the speaker, Dale Skaggs, Director of Horticulture, for the Dixon Gallery and Gardens.

Dale spoke on boxwood and donated a book and two plants that were given away at the end of his presentation. Dale also announced that the Dixon is looking for new docents to give tours of the gardens and asked that anyone interested in doing this contact Norma Montesi to register for the training. At 7:50, Carol called the business meeting to order. Tom Mashour gave the

Treasurer's report.

Carol announced MAMG received notification our (501)(c)(3) application was approved.

Dr. Chris Cooper announced that he has been selected to attend a meeting of Extension Service agents in Washington, D.C.

Dr. Cooper also announced that the June Public Tours Project "Through our Garden Gates" would be a CoRe project for this year. Volunteer sign-ups are now available.

Chris announced that PAR was going to need additional funds to set up the new demonstration garden at Davies Manor. Carol, Kay McAdams, and Tom Mashour discussed the details of what was needed and questions were taken from the floor. The motion was voted on and approved to approve \$4,000 for start-up costs at Davies Manor.

There are Share and Learn presentation opportunities available in August and November. Presenters receive 2 hours of teaching credit. Contact Jean Ward-Jones if interested.

Other announcements: Garden Jumble is set June 26th. Youth Plant Camp in June is accepting volunteer sign-ups. Volunteers will be limited to working no more than two days. Ask-a-Master Gardener Clinics are now available at the Collierville Victory Gardens the first and last Monday nights from 6:30 to 8:30 in June, July, and August. These are CoRe hours. Horticulture Magazine had an article on MAMG Plant-a-Row Project and Collierville Victory Gardens this month.

Thank you to all Spring Fling volunteers, especially Chairman Linda Taylor. There were 59 vendors, 14 new this year. Two hundred sixty eight Master Gardeners volunteered. The festival made a profit of over \$5,000 this year.

Carol adjourned the meeting at 8:15 p.m.



Kristin Lambertson, Interpretive Gardens Specialist at Strawberry Plains Audubon Center, will give presentations at 2:00 and 3:00 on attracting wildlife.

Play with Your Food at Plant Camp

Summer is on its way and it is time for boys and girls ages 8 to 12 to sign up for Plant Camp AND for Master Gardeners to volunteer to help with this CoRe project.

The theme of the camp this year is "Plant it, Grow it, Eat it." About 30 campers will delve into the mysteries of where food originates and experiment with growing some themselves during a week filled with games, discussions, and hands on projects. On-site field trips offer a wonderful chance to explore the outdoors and the plants that sustain us. Campers will make some "take-home" projects and also receive a Plant Camp T-shirt.

Plant Camp is held at Agricenter International, near the Red Barn. It takes place outside under the trees unless the weather forces it indoors. This year's plant camp will run from Monday June 7 to Friday June 11. Hours for campers are 9am to Noon. Volunteers sign up for 5 hour slots, 8am to 1pm, to allow time to prepare before campers arrive and to put away at the end of the morning and, of course, to make sure every child has been picked up.

Because helping at Plant Camp has been so popular, the organizers ask that each MAMG volunteer sign up for a maximum of 2 days to allow more individuals a chance to take part this year. Volunteers can sign up at the next MAMG meeting at the Agricenter on Thursday May 13. Plant Camp is a CoRe project and hours earned may be counted as Extension, Community, or Teaching.

Children from a wide range of schools, as well as home schoolers, come to Plant Camp. Some return for several years. Campers get to be outside, and do things like dabble in the dirt, paint, use real tools to make craft projects, go to the Outdoor Classroom, and even meet a few friendly wild creatures. Snakes and honey bees have been



among the critters to visit Plant Camp in the past.

This summer, campers will plant and harvest edible plants, learn about other ways plants are used, and go on an adventure to see some of the edible plants that grow in our region. Campers should wear comfortable clothes and shoes, such as tennis shoes, for walking and to protect their feet.

Each day has a coordinator who explains to the volunteers what preparations are needed for that day. MAMG volunteers and coordinators set up, prepare activities and snacks, help children with the activities, and help clean up at the end of the morning. They are assisted by several teen volunteers, some of whom attended Plant Camp when they were younger.

It is based on an old plan developed by Tom Pellett and implemented by Mary with native plants and woodland plants designed to have points of interest throughout the year. It will be in deep shade for the tour. The public garden is the V&E Greenline Garden with full sun and raised beds; it's a registered Monarch waystation.

Chris' backyard borders Audubon Park and he has been building beds for the last four years. Many of the plants and shrubs were moved from his previous home in Shelby Forest.
