
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Fall Luncheon: Bill Bass and the Big Bopper by Bruce Wheeler

The 19th President of UT, Dr. Joe Johnson (1990-1999), will introduce Dr. DiPietro. Dr. Johnson has been associated with UT since 1963 in numerous administrative positions such as President Andy Holt's executive assistant, chancellor for the Center for the Health Sciences in Memphis, vice president for development, and interim UT President for 2003-2004. He currently serves as a very active President Emeritus. In addition to his leadership capabilities, Dr. Joe is known for his sense of humor. I'm sure that will come out in grand style when he introduces "the other Dr. Joe" to all of us.

"Now that I've retired, what's next financially?" Retirement Income Strategies, a talk by Andrew C. Craft was part of the UT Life Planning Seminar on September 11, By Kathleen Bennett, UTRA Benefits Committee Chairperson

A cursory glance at the amount of advice available on the Internet for detailing and exploring retirement income strategies can lead to more confusion rather than less. In some ways the method of paying yourself first, a cornerstone of so many financial plans, is simple to execute. Sign the forms and the money flows away, to grow and multiply. Then the long-awaited retirement arrives and the flow reverses, with the funds now being dispersed to the saver to fund that retirement. But, imagine entering or being in retirement and not knowing how long your money will last. What if you couldn't pay for food, housing or fuel? What if you couldn't pay for medical expenses? These are some of the uncertainties facing retirees and those nearing retirement.

Andrew C. Craft, a Certified Financial Planner™ professional and Chartered Financial Consultant with over 16 years experience in the industry presented the seminar to explain:

- How economic challenges impact saving for retirement
- How to manage the risks of retirement
- How the Essential Income Planning process works.

Educate Yourself

Many financial organizations, including your local bank, offer e-mail newsletters with jargon-free overviews of the current state of the markets, financial and housing. If you are already contributing to a retirement fund, look around the company website for financial planning assistance. Reading targeted sources on a regular basis can help you build a keener understanding of the issues facing retirees.

Get the Facts on Today's Economic Issues

When you begin to research around global economic issues that might impact your investments, be careful about the sources of information you choose. Be sure to identify at least two reputable sources and read briefly in each around a particular topic to achieve an unbiased look at the issues. Another wonderful option today is the wide availability of intelligent podcasts. Download and listen to financial information. Podcasts are generally geared toward the general interested public. One recommendation: "Planet Money," a production of National Public Radio (NPR). These podcasts run around 25 minutes and are engaging and informative.

Retiree Cost of Living Increases

Federal Guidelines

- 1. Any Social Security cost of living increase is based on the 12 months period of inflationary growth during the federal government's past fiscal year, Oct. 1 Sep. 20.
- 2. Social Security actually considers these yearly increases effective as of December but recipients first see this increased amount appearing in their January check.

Tennessee Requirements

- 1. Any Tennessee Consolidated cost of living increase is based on December of the first year compared to December of the second year. All CPI items are included using the U. S. City Average, which is mandated by Tennessee law.
- 2. Prior to 1998, the TCRS Cost of Living percentage increase was based on the dollar amount in that individual's FIRSTEVER check. 1998 was the year when the compounded COLA was implemented, increasing the amount based on that individual's LAST previous check amount before any withholdings.
- 3. Any recipient must have been on retirement for at least one whole Tennessee fiscal year: July 1 through June 30.
- 4. No increase of above a 3% maximum per year is provided regardless of the actual inflation growth. If the CPI increase is less than .05%, no COLA benefit increase is given.
