



Bilingual is Better: Two Latina Moms on How the Bilingual Parenting Revolution is Changing the Face of America by Ana L. Flores and Roxana A. Soto is a parenting memoir about raising multicultural and bilingual children in modern American culture. It "debunks old stereotypes while shedding light on hot topics like bilingual education, cultural heritage, and what it really means to be Latino".





Margaret and Margarita: Margarita y Margaret by Lynn Reiser is a story about two girls who don't speak the same language. But they don't let that stop them from playing together and having a good time. A duallanguage book for ages 4 and up.

Research Update Baumrind's parenting styles (authoritarian, authoritative, permissive, and neglectful) are widely used in research and practice; however, when looking at research on Latino families there is little evidence for these four categories. The four parenting styles are based on two parenting dimensions (responsiveness/ warmth and demandingness/parental control). The authors added a third dimension (autonomy granting) to create eight parenting styles. When they did this, they found that the original four styles only accounted for about 1/3 of the Latino families, suggesting that traditional parenting categories do not capture Latinos' parenting styles well. The authors suggest adding four more styles, one of which is protective parenting (61% of Latino parents were in this new group). Protective parents are rated high on warmth, high on demandingness, and low on autonomy granting.
