Marc Schlossberg is an Associate Professor of Planning, Public Policy and Management (PPPM) and Co-Director of the Sustainable Cities

Initiative (SCI) at the University of Oregon. His research focuses on active transportation, complete streets, urban and community participation related to enhancing active transportation design, planning, and policy. Professor Schlossberg was a 2010 Distinguished Fulbright Scholar and 2012 Faculty Innovator of the Year, along with Nico Larco, awarded by the Association for the Advancement of Sustainability in higher Education (AASHE). He holds a PhD from the University of Michigan, and prior to academia worked professionally in the nonprofit sector and was a United States Peace Corps Volunteer in Fiji.



Nico Larco is an Associate Professor in the Department of Architecture and is a Co-Director of the Sustainable Cities

Initiative (SCI) at the University Oregon. His research focus is on urban sustainable design, active transportation, street design, and how urban design affects the sustainability of buildings. Professor Larco was a 2012/13 Distinguished Fulbright Scholar in Spain and has received numerous national and international awards for his work. He is a licensed architect has worked and professionally in the fields of Architecture, Urban Design, Planning, and Development.
