Jacobs, who is also a current professional wrestler with the WWE, met with student veterans to discuss his plans as new mayor.

Upon arrival, Jacobs was met by VRC Coordinators Jayetta Rogers, Vickie Clark, Thomas Cruise, and Student Veteran Brent Bennae.

Bennae, a senior in animal science, has been a fan of Jacobs long before he became mayor.

“I can remember staying up late just to watch him every Monday night,” Bennae said.

“It’s awesome that I get to see him in person now as my mayor.”

Over a warm bowl of chili, Jacobs shared his support for the veteran community and discussed some of his upcoming plans.

One focus, Jacobs noted, is to work with local and state governments to combat the current opioid problem across East Tennessee.

Jacobs was presented a challenge coin by the VRC staff to express gratitude for his visit and support for UT and the veteran community.

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## Veteran Spotlight

**Name:** Paul Finley

**UT Affiliation:** UT Police- Corporal

**Military Service:** ARMY (regular) Active Duty 19D Cavalry Scout, Bradley Crewmember, Stryker Crewmember. 240B Gunner. Left Army service on hardship discharge (honorable) 2.5 yrs due to spouse injury during deployment in OIF.

**What do you love about UT?** I was surprised to find so many people here that I could relate to and to see how positive this area was in support of veterans. I have been to a lot of places that do not project the same sentiment. When I interviewed at UTPD approximately 5 years ago, I was shocked to learn that both Chief Lane and Assistant Chief Lambert had served and to find the department was home to several other veterans representing multiple branches. The UTPD has been very good to me during my time here. The department represents values and morals that are my own and I am proud to continue to serve the community as a part of this group.



**What advice would you give to student veterans?** Stay engaged! If you are not already, get involved with the VRC. When I got out of the service I had some GI bill money. The job market wasn't great and I was working construction, running and repairing heavy equipment. I decided to go to school to take advantage of the benefits. I soon found out I was in a strange place with people I had a difficult time relating to. They didn't understand me and I really didn't want to understand them.

I was several years older than most of the other students and thought about leaving the program a lot. My school of choice didn't have any resources for people with my experiences. I eventually ran into another veteran who also happened to be a Cav Scout. We were able to work through a lot of the frustrations as we were both having similar problems. VA had issues with payments, allowances were incorrect, classes were...well you get the picture. Long story short, I had a couple run-ins with local law enforcement and although they weren't all bad, they were, as a whole, not good.

From that point forward I figured I could either continue to be frustrated by that kind of thing or I could find a way to make a difference, or at least try. I eventually worked my way through school, obtained two degrees and went on to put myself through a law enforcement academy. Eventually, I ended up here in Knoxville with the UTPD, where I have been fortunate enough to have had the opportunity to address some of the issues I faced from the other side. You have a great group of people working for you in the VRC. This past week, I, along with UTPD Corporal Brad Duerr (US ARMY Ret.), were able to speak to several veterans at the VRC and answer some questions about Campus Concealed Carry and Handgun Carry in Tennessee. Over the next semester, UTPD will continue to partner with the VRC to deliver programs relating to topics of interest to Veteran students, staff and faculty. I look forward to meeting you there. 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## Introducing the Trout Unlimited Veterans Service Partnership (VSP)



On a national level, TU partners include Student Veterans of America, Embrace-A-Vet, Warriors and Quiet Waters, and Project Healing Waters Fly Fishing, among others. It falls to each local Trout Unlimited chapter to establish those partnerships at a local level.

Locally, the Clinch River Chapter of TU in Norris is seeking opportunities to partner with additional veterans groups in the Knoxville area, Vol Fighters Student Veterans of America for example. No experience or equipment is necessary.

Through organized activities, our volunteers will teach the skills to make you a successful fisherman. Through our veteran programs, there are opportunities for fly fishing, fly tying, rod building, family events, and camaraderie with other veterans.

Trout Unlimited offers a free, one-year introductory membership for all veterans participating in its VSP programs.
