The Great Smoky Mountains Heritage Center, GSMHC, is a jewel tucked away in the mountains of East Tennessee. It is located in the historic and scenic community of Townsend which is a gateway to the Great Smoky

Mountains National Park. The Center is first and foremost a museum; a museum whose mission is to preserve, protect and promote the unique history and rich culture of the people who inhabited the Great Smoky Mountains and the surrounding area. While here you can travel back in time to learn about Cherokee culture and the migration of European settlers.

While visiting the Heritage Center, you'll have the opportunity to view the Main Gallery, home to our Native Americans of East TN Collection and the East TN Mountain Culture exhibits. Also housed in the main building is the National Parks Gallery – A tribute to the five National Parks of East TN. Directly behind the main building is our Historic Village; a collection of historic buildings and barns brought to us from around the region. The Transportation Station houses an impressive display of modes of transportation ranging from mules to wagons to Model T's and more. The entire main building and the outdoor amphitheater are accessible by wheelchair, and the gravel pathways in the Historic Village have been specifically designed for ADA compliance.

Cades Cove is a broad, verdant valley surrounded by mountains and is one of the most popular destinations in the Great Smokies. It offers some of the best opportunities for wildlife viewing in the park. Large numbers of white-tailed deer are frequently seen, and sightings of black bear, coyote, ground hog, turkey, raccoon, skunk, and other animals are also possible. For hundreds of years Cherokee Indians hunted in Cades Cove but archeologists have found no evidence of major settlements. The first Europeans settled in the cove sometime between 1818 and 1821. By 1830 the population of the area had already swelled to 271.

Cades Cove offers the widest variety of historic buildings of any area in the national park. While touring along the 11-mile loop road by chartered van you will have the opportunity to view/visit three churches, a working grist mill, barns, log houses, and many other faithfully restored eighteenth and nineteenth century structures. So, whether you're a regular to Cades Cove or a 'first-timer' this guided tour will provide you the opportunity to experience the ecology and history of Cades Cove as never before.

Blackberry Farm - As the sun rises over the foothills of the Great Smoky Mountains, the morning mist fades to unveil one of America's greatest hidden treasures, Blackberry Farm. Its 4,200 acres have been a mountain haven and tranquil escape for family, friends and guests for more than 70 years as it evolved into a luxurious resort of breathtaking scenery, gourmet cuisine and pleasurable pastimes.

In the 1930's, Florida and Dave Lasier were enthralled by the majesty of these mountains and, on a trip from Chicago to the Georgia coast, discovered the perfect setting for their dream home. In 1930, while selecting just the right location, Florida snagged her silk stockings in a thicket of blackberry bushes, and the name Blackberry Farm was born.

A tour of the gardens, that are meticulously maintained, will be hosted by the expert gardeners on staff at Blackberry. Attendees will observe the gardening practices that promote sustainability of the soil and while producing wholesome fruits and vegetables for consumption at the farm and nearby farmers' markets. Located in a pastoral setting in the foothills of the Smokies the gardens will transport visitors to a simpler time and place of refreshing as they experience the fragrance of soil, plant and mountain air blended together for a memorable experience.
