PIVOTING TO A NEW LSP



Has your library ever been faced with the challenge of sharing collections beyond your library's walls? As a result of the pandemic, the UT Libraries encountered such a challenge. Faced with closing its library buildings to the public for weeks, the Libraries closely examined its services and programs so the needs of a virtual learning environment could be met. One such program was the Libraries' Culture Corner. This Library Diversity Committee sponsored initiative showcases library resources that discuss various cultural issues and themes. This session will share details of the creative response to continuing the Culture Corner with a Virtual Culture Corner in the absence of a physical space to be able to share cultural knowledge and resources with the campus community. Launching an online format has resulted in many new opportunities for the Corner. This new format has also offered the ability to feature resources that are housed beyond the walls of the Libraries. Additionally, the session will discuss lessons learned and future plans to maintain the Virtual Culture Corner as an expansion of the physical one. Creating a customized Virtual Culture Corner is a great model for multiple library entities to incorporate their topics of interest to reach new populations.





TAMING CERBERUS

By April 2020, librarians at the University of Tennessee, Knoxville could see Cerberus on the horizon. The three-headed monster of a pandemic, annual cost increases, and a potential budget decrease meant that it would be impossible to pay for all of the resources needed for teaching, research, and learning. To stave off the monster, staff from two departments implemented an intense and thorough review process for all of the 2,400 subscriptions due for renewal. Staff and students in one department compiled usage data, calculated cost per use, and created a searchable database of this data. Staff in a second department would consult this data before renewing a resource. Subject librarians were asked to review resources if the cost per use was deemed too high, while librarians across two departments renegotiated prices for the resources that were retained. These initiatives involved more than 40 staff, resulted in \$200,000 in deselections, and an approximately \$350,000 in savings. The lessons from the year of Cerberus will inform future practice in hopes that the three-headed monster does not rear its head anytime soon. This presentation will detail the methods used to conduct the intense review process and how the methods will be implemented on a regular review cycle going forward. Attendees can expect to walk away with the knowledge to adopt a similar process at their institutions.
